The newly formed KAMM Grant Program offers local communities an opportunity for assistance with a mitigation project. The program allocates funds for projects that promote hazard mitigation and management or mitigation awareness in your community.

- Flood Hazard Mitigation:
 - Upgrade undersized drainage systems
 - Stream / river cleanups
- Stormwater Management Mitigation:
 - Rain barrels
 - Rain garden
 - Green Infrastructure practices
- Conservation of Natural Features and Resources:
 - Reforestation projects
 - Parks or Open Space
- Educational Awareness:
 - Field trips/public outreach
 - Signage to promote mitigation
 - Community mitigation library
 - Flood warning systems
- Local match funding for a larger mitigation grant

Please provide a description of the location, problem, solution, benefits of mitigation and the estimated project costs and schedule. Mitigation projects that support community involvement and engagement will receive priority.
